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In Honor of Our Veterans: At 10:30 on the evening of September 25<sup>th</sup>, a very special event took place. Veterans and their guardians returned to the Cincinnati Airport from a day long Honor Flight to Washington DC. Honor Flight Tri-State has a simple mission- to Fly as many World War II and Korean Veterans to see their memorials in Washington DC as possible— as fast as possible! Guardians are volunteers who accompany the veterans and play an important and significant role on flights, ensuring that every veteran has a safe and memorable experience. This trip is of no cost to Veterans, but Guardians, who must apply for the opportunity, are responsible for paying their own airfare. On this particular flight half of the veterans were from WWII and half were Korean Veterans. Two veterans fought in both wars and the oldest veteran involved was 96 years old.

Our own Amy Barron was Guardian for her father, Ed Yorgen, during this wonderful daylong adventure. Sgt. Yorgan was stationed in Butzbach, Germany during the Korean War and was among the first troops sent there when Russian tension was at its height following the end of WWII.
